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## **HIV and AIDS**Prevalence

As we commemorate World AIDS Day on 1st December, we can't help but look back and celebrate the many achievements made in the fight against HIV and AIDS. The infection is no longer a death sentence as it used to be, thanks to the many inventions that have reduced the veracity of the virus. Prevention efforts have been effective also. Trends show a steady and notable decline in the prevalence of infection across the world.

In Uganda for instance, significant strides have been made on different fronts of the war against HIV and AIDS. Recently released data show a reduction in HIV prevalence from 18% in the '80s to 5.5%. Today people can talk openly about the disease including their status without fear of rejection and ostracism. Though not completely eliminated, stigma has effectively reduced. However, to many young people, these statistics can just pass as ordinary numbers. After all, they have no idea of how the wind of HIV and AIDS swept across Uganda ravaging lives and pushing communities to the precipice of extinction.

On the flip side of the positive trends being recorded, there lies a rather disturbing reality about the spread of HIV and AIDS. For a long

prevalence was reported more among people above the age of 20 years old. It is surprising that as the general prevalence is declining in the country the rate of infection and prevalence among adolescents and young people is on the increase. As part of the experiences of adolescence and teenage. risk-taking tendencies and the inclination to want to experiment especially on matters of sexuality is partly responsible for this unfortunate trend. Inequality in different aspects of HIV is also to blame for the increasing number of infections among adolescents and young people. For a long time, young people have been left out of the various strategies for combating HIV and AIDS. Nonprofit organizations and government agencies have not been deliberate and aggressive in designing programs that address the unique needs of adolescents and young people. That is why this year the theme for World AIDS Day is "Ending inequalities among Adolescent girls, young women, and boys". Young people are encouraged to wear a red ribbon: the universal symbol of awareness, support for, and solidarity with people living with HIV. Young people are especially challenged to behave responsibly because HIV and AIDS are still a grim reality in our society.


