



Year 6 enjoyed finding out about one of the languages in Uganda, Luganda. They learnt about the alphabet and discovered this letter only exists in Luganda!



Whole School Assembly and Drumming Session





Understanding Epilepsy

Prevalence of Epilepsy in Uganda

Like anywhere in the world, Epilepsy is relatively common in Uganda. Almost 2 in every 100 individuals have this condition.



The Rainbow Learning Support team recently had training in Epilepsy delivered by Dr. Eriya Ssenyonga and his clinical team from Bakamai Hospital, as some students in school have Epilepsy, and staff and the school community must be aware of the points outlined in this article.

Definition of Epilepsy

Epilepsy is a chronic neurological disorder characterized by recurrent seizures. These seizures, also known as fits or convulsions, result from sudden and uncontrolled bursts of neuronal activity within the central nervous system. This condition is often described as a "grey matter disease" because it affects the brain's grey matter, leading to abnormal electrical activity and seizures.

Understanding Epilepsy: Myths, Risk Factors, and Proper Management

As mentioned above, Epilepsy is a neurological disorder affecting millions of people worldwide, including some within our school community.

It is essential to have accurate information about Epilepsy to dispel myths, understand its risk factors, and know how to manage it effectively. In this text, we'll delve into the definition of Epilepsy, its risk factors, clinical characteristics, and proper management techniques. We'll also address some common myths surrounding Epilepsy, particularly those prevalent in Uganda.

Risk Factors

Several factors can increase the risk of developing Epilepsy. These include Family History of Epilepsy: Individuals with close relatives who have Epilepsy may be at a higher risk of developing the condition. Metabolic Disorders: Certain metabolic disorders can predispose individuals to Epilepsy. Severe Head Injuries: A history of severe head injuries can increase the likelihood of developing Epilepsy later in life. Severe Malaria (Cerebral Malaria): In some cases, cerebral malaria can lead to Epilepsy due to its impact on the brain.

Clinical Characteristics

Recognizing the clinical characteristics of Epilepsy can help in providing appropriate assistance during a seizure episode. Common signs and symptoms of a seizure include Seizures Preceded by Audible Sound: Some individuals may experience a distinctive sound before a seizure occurs. Loss of Consciousness: During a seizure, the person may lose consciousness. Loss of Bowel or Bladder Control: Involuntary loss of bowel or bladder control can occur. Falling: Seizures may cause the person to fall to the ground. Muscle Rigidity: Muscles may become rigid during a seizure.

Proper Management

Proper management during a seizure is crucial to ensure the safety and well-being of the individual:

- Stay Calm and Remain with the Person: Offer reassurance and stay with the individual until they fully recover.
- Remove Objects: Clear the surrounding area of any objects that could cause harm during a seizure.
- Protect the Head: Place something soft under the person's head to prevent head injuries.
- Clear the Mouth: After the seizure, clear the mouth of any vomit or food to ensure unobstructed breathing.
- Recovery Position: Gently place the person in a recovery position after the seizure to aid breathing and prevent choking.
- Do Not Restrain or Move the Person: Avoid restraining or moving the person unless they are in immediate danger.
- In Vehicles or Wheelchairs: If the person is in a car or wheelchair, keep them seated if possible.

Myths about Epilepsy in Uganda

In many African communities, Epilepsy is often misunderstood, leading to harmful myths and stigmatization. Some common myths include: *Epilepsy is contagious*: Epilepsy is not contagious and cannot be spread through contact. *Epilepsy is caused by witchcraft:* Epilepsy has a neurological basis and is not caused by supernatural forces. *People with Epilepsy are cursed*: Epilepsy is a medical condition, not a curse. It can affect anyone, regardless of their background.

The representatives themselves all showed excellent and diverse character, giving insight into what


They entertained the never ending questions and offered us all winning arguments as to why their University was the best. Here are the top three tips from the representatives, for those attending the fair next academic year:
