



We had to do our best. We acted and acted like no tomorrow!






The Big Day:



He told us even though you don't stay in the sports industry you can still be something like a sports lawyer.



Then Mr Musau came to talk to us about business studies IGCSE.He told us that The term business refers to an organisation or enterprising entity engaged in commercial, industrial, or professional activities. Then Mr Mbungu told us about accounting IGCSE.Accounting is simply bookkeeping work to manage finances, keeping track of revenue, expenses, investments, trends, and goal.For example let's say you have a friend if he borrows 5k and then another friend comes and he give you 10k for saving do you see how you made 15k.

Then Mr Oboth came and started to talk to us about Sociology. Sociology is the study of social life, social change, and the social causes and consequences of human behaviour. Sociologists investigate the structure of groups, organisations, and societies, and how people interact within these contexts.

For example, let's say you have a 6 on a paper but if you show it to person A, it's a 6. But if you show it to person B upside down its a 9. So really Sociology is the way people perceive things.



For the last one month, our year 12 students have been exploring Bridge U - an internationally acclaimed forum that represents a diverse community of international school students, teachers, guidance counsellors and higher education institutions across 140+ countries, with the aim of cultivating the dreams and ambitions of international school students by facilitating their journey of exploration, research, and application to the most suitable global higher education institutions.

Our year 12 students have so far identified the countries they are interested in attending their university education, set their academic targets, identified the courses they would like to do at university, shortlisted some universities—and even written their personal preferences- regarding their university destinations. During this second half of the term, we will be using the portal to create a plan for application writing and draft personal statements and common app essays.

Work Experience

To contribute to our students' personal growth, skill development, and increased readiness for the transition to higher education, in June this year, our year 10 and 12 students will go for a one week and two weeks' work experience respectively.

Work experience is very beneficial for year 10 students as it introduces them to explore their careers- allowing them to explore various industries and professions. This exposure helps them understand different career paths and make more informed decisions about their future. Early work experience also provides an opportunity for skill development as students can enhance their communication, teamwork, problem-solving, and time management skills, which are valuable in both academic and professional settings. In addition, gaining work experience early contributes development of a robust resume. Even simple part-time jobs or volunteer work can demonstrate responsibility and work ethic to employers or college admissions officers. Exposure to the work environment students understand professional helps expectations, workplace etiquette, and the importance of reliability and accountability.

12 For the year students, work experience is a valuable addition to college applications and resumes as it demonstrates a proactive attitude and a willingness to learn bevond classroom. It helps them refine these goals and choose college majors or career paths that align with their interests and skills. With work experience opportunities, year 12 students can take on roles with increased responsibility which can boost confidence and prepare them for the challenges of higher education and the workforce. Lastly positive work experiences in year 12 can to lead valuable references applications for higher education. College admissions officers often appreciate real-world experiences that highlight a student's capabilities.

Last year, both our year 10 and 12 students went to various workplaces from industries to law firms, to hospitals and pharmacies, to telecom companies and even schools to gain some work experience and reviews from their supervisors were mostly glowering.








Current hot weather

You might have noticed the rising temperatures and heat in Kampala lately. That is because Uganda is one of the East African countries experiencing hot weather. Many parts of Uganda are experiencing a dry spell or high temperatures. However, this is not a Ugandan phenomenon alone. The intense heat is increasingly frequent globally due to climate change.



What weather conditions should we brace ourselves for?

The Uganda National Meteorological Authority predicts that the country is expected to be much warmer than usual. The climate outlook for February 2024 and rainfall performance for January 2024 indicates that most parts of the country are likely to remain dry and sunny with hazy conditions

Precautions to take during the heat wave period

Wear lightweight, light-coloured, loose, and porous cotton clothes. Use protective goggles, umbrella/hat, shoes while going out in sun. Avoid strenuous activities when the outside temperature is high. Avoid working outside between 12 noon and 3 p.m.

Dog Man Three stories in one by Kato


